Kasuti Embrodery -Karnataka

The Kasuti Embroidery of Karnataka is a special craft practiced mainly in Dharwad district (Karnataka). The secret of this age old craft is that it can be done only by counting the threads of weft and warp of cloth and no design can be traced or implemented as outlines.

The whole work is time consuming as it involves precision and embroidery on both sides of the cloth.

Traditionally, it is used on Ilkal sarees and blouse pieces. Initially women folk practiced temple motifs, and designs. The Kasuti embroidery is reflective of strong traditional designs like palanquins, elephants, and creeping lotuses. The Ilkal sarees carries designs of temple towers indicative of lasting influence. Mostly Ilkal sarees are nine yards in length.

The Kasuti work now a days invariably is done on voil, cotton, and silk ones. It is also done on salwar-kameez sets, carry bags, pillow covers, furnishing materials. It takes nearly five to seven days for Kasuti embroidery on each sarees depending on the design and at least one day for a dress material. At

Beer valli, a sleepy village in Kalghatgi taluk of Dharwad district is abuzz with creative activity. It is now common to see group of girls, in the age group of 13-22 engrossed in Kasuti work in the houses here.

The artisans get orders from nearby
Itubli town. Two to three exporters
regularly give the orders. Youngsters now
a days like wearing a blouse carrying
Kasuti designs on top of their jeans.

## Kasuti Embroidery-Karnataka

(mainly in Dharwad District and surrounding Districts in Northern Karnataka).

Dharwad district is one of the districts of Northern Karnataka. The district is bounded by Belgaum district in the North, Haveri district in South, Gadag district in East, Uttarakannada district in West.

The district has 5 taluks

- (i) Dharwad
- (ii) Hubli
- (iii) Kalghatgi
- (iv) Kundagod
- (v) Navalgund.

Area of the district is 4263 sq Kms which is 2.2% of total geographical area

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of the state. In the district ,Hubli-Dharwad corporation is the leading corporation

The total population of the district Is 16.04 lakhs

The district is the home town of Kasuti embroidery. It is practiced mainly here. The district has vocational schools of arts and crafts established in 1957 at Dharwad under Janatha Shikshana Samiti maintained by a trust under the chairmanship of Shri D. Veerendra Hegde of Dharmastala.

NABARD in association with Malaprabha Grameena Bank has organized a meeting some time back at Beervalli village, in Kalghatgi taluk, Dharwad district, in which almost all artisans exhibited Kasuti works done by them. Encouraged by this

NABARD has adopted Karnataka's Kasuti work in Kalghatgi taluk in Dharwad district under National Programme for Rural Industries (NPRI) for skill up gradations and marketing.

NABARD and Malaprabha Grameena
Bank, have planned to declare Beer
Valli (Kalghatgi taluk in Dharwad
district) and other villages as Kasuti
Cluster Villages. The relevant papers in
this regard is enclosed.

(g) Description of Goods.

Kasuti is an unique form of embroidery confining to Karnataka and particularly to Dharwad district. The secret of this age old embroidery form is that it can be done only by counting the threads of the warp and weft and to designs that can be traced or implemented as outlines. Traditionally it is done on Ilkal sarees, and Blouse pieces. Four types of Kasuti works are done viz, Neyge Kasuti, Muragi Kasuti, Menthye Kasuti, and Gavanthi Kasuti. There are about 700 designs under categories like Gandole Kamala, Gopi Kamala, Chittu . Kamala, Gundala Gopura, Dagabazi Gopura, Gandole gida Tulasi, Kalee, Peacock, Neuge Godambi, Elephant, Lions, Venkipatti, Kayapatti etc. The embroidery work is normally undertaken

as a job work and done on voil, cotton and silk ones.

The range of Kasuti designs are enclosed.

This art is exclusively practiced at Northern Karnataka, and mainly in Dharwad district.

(i) Proof of Origin :(Historical Origin)

Embroidery is an ancient art of our country. At Ajantha, men wearing embroidered coats with diagonal stripes alternatively with floral ones are depicted. Indian embroidery takes its inspiration from nature and the products of any region reflects the colours of the flora and fauna of that area.

The typical traditional

Karnataka Kasuti art in embroidery is
traced to the period of chalukaya where
a great renaissance in the field of art and
architecture took place. Religion also
seems to have had a great influence on
the designs adopted in Karnataka for
Kasuti embroidery, as is seen from the
architectural patterns of temple
'Gopuras', 'Pushkarnis', 'Tulasi',

'Brindavana' etc.

As Per leading Newspaper Deccan
Herald (www.deccanherald.com/deccan
herald/oct31, 2004) " Kasuti is one of
the traditional creative arts of the
state, native to parts of northern
Karnataka; though it has been around
for ages, it came to be known only in
recent years after Kasuti embroidery
work on salwar kameez"

"Kasuti is an unique form of embroidery confining **only** to Karnataka particularly to Dharwad district.

As reported in the Economic Times dated December 12, 2002, "Kasuti embroidery often goes into Ilkal sarees which is 1000 years old tradition".

The paper published on Kasuti by Mrs. Sunitha Shahaney and details on colours of Kasuti published in Deccan Herald and relevant News Items published in Various magazines and The Hindu dated Sep 20<sup>th</sup> 2000 are enclosed.

(j) Methods of Production:

The customers supply the sarees and select the design from the catalogue in the first instance. There after on the basis of selected designs, thread of the required colour is selected and then Kasuti work is done by counting the warp

and weft. By dexterous manipulation of hands using ordinary sewing needle and coloured threads, wonderful verities of designs are embroidered on the cloth. Of the four kinds of stitches that are used (Gavanthi, Murgi, Negi and Menthi stitches), Gavanthi is the most commonly used double running stitch which is worked in horizontal and diagonal directions.

The work is time consuming as it involves precision and embroidery on both sides of cloth. It takes nearly five to seven days for Kasuti embroidery on each sarees depending on the design and atleast a day for the dress material.

(K) Uniqueness

Kasuti work involves precision and embroidery on both sides of cloth, and is time consuming. Kasuti work has no right or wrong side. Kasuti art is traditional to Northern Karnataka and has empowered rural women to a great extent.

The Kasuti embroidery is reflective of strong traditional designs and motifs like palanquins, elephants and creeping lotuses.

National Bank of Agriculture and Development (NABARD) in association with Malaprabha Grameena Bank has declared Beer

Valli village in Dharwad district and other villages as "Kasuti Cluster villages", and planned to provide further training facilities on modern designs.

Essentially, this kind of embroidery was popular among the women folk, notably those belonging to sculptors household who were engaged in temple construction.

As reported in Deccan Herald dated Oct 31/2004, and as extracted from website, it is common see group of girls in the age group of 13-22, engrossed in Kasuti work in the houses here. Instead of wasting all their time watching television, they keep themselves busy through out the day with Kasuti orders which fetches them a handsome income every month. This has indirectly providing employment to women in rural areas.

(1) Inspection body

KSHDC makes visual inspection on type of designs ordered on Kasuti embroidery products. It consults

(m) Others:

KSHDC is actively engaged in promoting this craft since it provides gainful employment to rural people in Dharwad district and also arranges for marketing of products.
